Candahar is in the hands of Mirza del Khan ^{Yar} the brother of Dost Moohammed the Chief of Kabul (and the son of the late Sultan Khan Bannu Khan hereditary ruler, whose assassination by Mahmood Shah the last King of the Suddos Lyee Dynasty led to the overthrow of that family and the transfer of the Government to the Nuzari sons.

The ruler of Peshawar is Sultan Mahmood Khan also a brother of the above. his Country is threatened with invasion by the Afghans.

Herat on the frontiers of Persia is occupied by Shah Zadah Khan a son of the last King Kabul Shah Moohammed.

Of all these Governments the best established seems to be that of Dost Moohammed Khan at Kabul.

me and informed me, that he sailed from Bombay on the 1st Suffer (16th April) that he experienced squalls on the way, which prevented him from going either to Mutalla, or Aden - He had a passenger on board a Memon named Comoon Bin Yaqoob. This Dow brought two letters - one for Mr Costa of the 14th Regiment, and the other for Lieutenant Shepherd. The Staguoda had some articles with him, which he wanted to leave with me on showing these letters - He has left these things with me - saying that he would take them away on the opening of the season -

A Bateel belonging to one of the Sheiks of Bahrein arrived on the 14th Rubecoolawul (28th May) The news by her is that a Messenger Mahomed Effendi from Khoorshed Paeha proceeded to Abdoolla Bin Ahmed at Hisan, and thence to Bahrein, with which a communication

communication had been opened, for Sheikh
Abdoolla Bin Ahmed had agreed to pay
to Khoorshed Pacha the tribute he used
to give to Fyzul.

On a separate sheet - dated 26th Reeb
beoolawul (or 9 June) -

I received a letter from Cap-
tain Hennell enclosing two, one for the sons
of the Imam, and the other for Hamood
bin Azan. These letters contained such
counsels as were calculated to protect
their interests against the attempt of Khoor-
shed Pacha, and amongst others the Res-
ident urged on the cordial alliance of
the parties as the best means for the
security and preservation of the territories
of both.

The Resident desired me to
ascertain and report to him the relations

existing

existing between them / the sons of Imam
and Hamood Bin Azan / and the
determination of each party -

On enquiry I learn that
Hamood is inclined to make common
cause with the Imams sons, and
to assist them and to be assisted by
them, particularly at a time when he
is in want of aid. The Imams sons
are also desirous of being friendly, but
will not assist Hamood with money
and men, They knowing that he and
his followers are short of cash, am-
munition, and rice.

On the 23rd Rabeelul
6 June) messengers arrived from
Saad Bin Mutlak bringing
letters

letters to the address of the Suman,
 and His Highness's sons. Amongst
 these there was a letter from
 Khoosheed Pacha, to the Suman.
 This latter letter stated, that the
 Khoosheed Pacha, had sent Saad
 Bin Abutthach, to Burmah, and
 Birman, and Govern-Omar, and re-
 quested the Suman to assist him
 to the interest of his power.
 Saad Bin Abutthach stated
 in his letter, that though he had
 for a long time remained in
 Shaga, and Kopsat Khyina, yet
 he did not gain anything from the
 Suman, that he was now proceed-
 ing to Burmah on the part of Khoos-
 heed Pacha, that he wished that
 on his arrival, the Suman would
 pay him what His Highness used
 to pay to Fyzul. The tribute
 paid to Fyzul was 5,000 Rials in
 Powder, Lead, and rice.

Translation of a letter from Ghaleb bin
Suggur, brother of Sultan bin Suggur to Syud
Shamir and Syud Mookhammad bin Salim
dated 5th Rube' al-hil or 19th May 1834.

I have not as yet received a letter
from you for a great while, which I trust
is owing to press of business.

Before this letter was written
the Sheiks together with Sultan bin Suggur
and Khalifa bin Shaboot assembled in
Rusud, Kuyyana and contemplated to sub-
mit to the English. They told Ghaleb
bin Muthlak to return to Mecca. My brother
sent a man for me. I accordingly re-
paired to him. When Saad bin Muthlak
shewed Khorsheed Pasha's letters to all
the Sheiks, which stated that he (Khor-
sheed Pasha) had appointed Saad bin
Muthlak, Governor of Oman, that those
who would not submit to him would
suffer the consequences. On seeing
this letter, the Sheiks acknowledged his
authority. Saad is therefore the Governor,
and does whatever he likes, no one has

yet suffered, except the Nuyun tribe, whose strength and influence have been declining every day, which is the consequence of their non submission. Saad bin Mutluck has sent Messengers with letters to Syud Sured (Governor of Muscat) & Syud Sured has returned, he will give a reply, but if not, you will have to answer these letters, and in that case I trust that you will determine upon the proper course. Saad bin Mutluck has also dispatched Messengers with letters from himself and to his brother Saad, to Hamood and Rajeel. Saad is at present in Sharga. I have given you this information from my regard to our friendship. Have the goodness to give my Compliments to Syud Hillata bin Sured.

by him, on his arrival at that Port, and
the dispatch of nine native Vessels be-
longing to different places in the Gulf,
which had been piratically seized by the
Benyas Tribe, and subsequently given
up to the Ships of war, by Shait Khuleya, a native Vessel
his Shaktoot, in compliance with the ^{demands}
demands made upon him.

2. Having received information
from Misat a short time previous to the ^{A Benyas Tribe}
arrival of the above communication, that ^{and cargo detained}
a Benyas Bateel with a valuable Cargo ^{in Misat}
from India, had been placed under sur-
bargo by the authorities of that place,
I immediately addressed a letter to them
to the effect, that the Vessel and Cargo
thus detained, might be set off against
the claim of 10,000 Dollars advanced by

them

Set off against them upon the Benijas chief for the value
 the claims proposed
 for the plunder of
 the Benijas Buzar of the cargo of the Muscat Buzla, lately
 plundered by his subjects. This commu-
 -nication is transmitted by the King An-
 -lew which as already reported, had been
 recovered from the Benijas, and was then
 about to be dispatched to Muscat, in
 conformity to the request of the Governor
 of that port.

Should list of de-
 -mands transmit-
 -ed to the King of
 -Siam -

Being enabled by this
 arrangement to diminish the amount
 of our demands upon the Benijas
 chief by the larger sum of 10,000. Spanish
 Crowns, and consequently materially
 to facilitate the settlement of the
 remaining balance, I had the honor
 in addressing a letter with a detail
 of the claims still to be adjusted for

transmission

transmission to the Commanding officer
of the Squadron off Aboukhadeb - copies
of these communications I have now
the honor to enclose for the information

tination and put you and the Political
Resident in possession of the movements
of the Anker and Elphinstone. I

I have likewise to
report, that I gave chase to three very
suspicious boats, which had come out
from under the Island 'Kaderatic' after
a while came up with them, and put
a shot across the headmost ones. They
have too, sent the cutter to examine
them; they proved to be Bahain boats,
standing to the Westward - I obtained
information from the Kakhodah of
these boats, who had been at anchor at
Chero the day before, that the Benga
Squadron were supposed to have left
for the opposite Coast after the capture
of the Pingax boats, as they had not been
seen

seen since, whether reliance may be placed in this statement, must remain to be proved, I think it probably true myself

Captain Coles appeared extremely thankful for our protection thus far on his voyage.
