I have the honor to enclose herewith a copy of a letter which I received last night from the Resident at Bushire accompanied by a bundle enclosed of two letters dated 27th and 31st April from that Gentleman to the Secret Committee detailing the circumstances attending a collision between the boat of the Property ship *Wellisley* and the garrison on board here of Bushire and announcing the departure of the Resident from that city to the island of Karak.

At the port of Bushire there are two landing places one close to the Residency the other situated at a remote part of the town. Admiral Sir Frederick Mackintosh on his arrival at Bushire made use of the Residency landing place which appears to have been
