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Translated Extract of a Letter from Khajak -
Kishak Agent at Muscat, to Major Bennett
Resident in the Persian Gulf - dated 1st Rajab
5th July.

I before acquainted you with the
departure of Khatan and Sybin Ali Zowahir
to Saad bin Mootluch on the subject of Peace
upon the Conditions suggested to the Authorities
by His Highness the Imam. Saad has consented
to peace on these conditions, that he should
pay over annually to Sybil bin Saad 5000
Reals on account of both Coast and Inland
Territories, and he furnished them with an
agreement to this effect sealed with his own
Seal. The truth is His Affairs are on a weak
footing than formerly, otherwise it is impossible
that He should have consented to peace
upon such Conditions, and I have learnt
that were not the Zowahir with him, and
Khalifa bin Shahibud his Ally, the Nassim
and their connections would commence
hostilities against and drive him from his
position - but by reason of their weakness, however
much any one / portion / desired to oppose him
the others afforded him assistance. On the
18th Jumadee ool Saanee (24th June) Khatan
returned and there came with him, for the
purpose

purpose of receiving the Peace-offering and Presents,
one Muttack bin Buttal and with him 40 men,
Wahabes. They assigned them a dwelling
and treated them with the greatest respect, until
their business was settled and they departed. As
far as I could ascertain, They gave them 5000
Reals especially for Syud ul Saood according
to agreement, 500 Reals for Saad himself, +
100 Reals, a cloth Dory, and a Shawl to Muttack
bin Buttal, 300 Reals to his attendants, to 35 Men
each a Shawl valued at 1/2 Reals, to 3 men each
a Wizar Doodle (a kind of Shawl worth about
6 or 7 Reals) and 60 Reals for the Wakebee
Priest at Dymce. They presented them also
with 400 Bags of Rice, 4 Hirtmas of Coffee
10 Sars of Gunpowder, 10 Pags of Lead and
some bars of Iron. On the 29th Jumadæ ul
akhira (5th July) they embarked in the Buggalah
of Akhtar, and proceeded to Multrah to
await his joining them there for the purpose
of accompanying them to Shinas, and thence
to Dymce. With reference to his (Saad's)
claims upon the Authorities of Sohar, in account
of the dependants who had submitted and
made peace - Akhtar purchased them for
the sons of Syud. Azar, for the sum of 2500
Crowns, that he should exercise no control
over them. In truth had not his influence

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been weakened, and he not observed " +
 disaffection, he had not yielded, but on the
 contrary had continually practised deceit for
 the purpose of extorting Money for notwith-
 standing the treaty of Peace that had been
 entered into between Syed Humood and
 him that he should not molest his Subjects,
 he was meditating Claims against him upon
 the ground that Sydul had written desiring
 him not to restore their dependancies to the
 sons of Ryan until he had cracked Money -
 On the 6th Jumader 1203 (12th June) came
 60 Men of the Hijraes, as Saad Sovereign
 intimidated, at the receipt of the letter from
 Saad bin Meethuk on 19th Jumader 1203
 had sent to that Tribe desiring 70 Men,
 and written to the Authorities of Sumail
 and Soor and its dependancies, and others
 in the neighbouring districts, requiring from
 each some Men for the protection of Muscat;
 and on the 14th June also arrived 50 Men of
 the Madaheen, but on the conclusion of Peace
 there being no need of these, they returned to
 their homes. -

Sir.

I have herewith the honor to forward for the information of the Council the Governor in Council the accompanying translation of a letter from the Agent at Muscat, reporting the return of the Mission despatched by the Authorities of that place to Sheer bin Moathuk the Wahabee Lieutenant in Oman, and the conclusion of peace between them, on the annual payment of (5000) Five thousand Crowns to Amoor Nysul himself, exclusive of presents to Sheer Moathuk and his Followers, amounting to about (2000) Two thousand more.

Shajah Nisihal attributes this unexpected moderation on the part of the Wahabee Lieutenant, to the breaking of his pavilion at By mee; but I am

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rather

rather inclined to ascribe the real cause to
the appearance of our Squadron off the
Arabian Coast; and the general impression
existing, that the aggressions upon the terri-
tories of His Highness the Imam, and those
of Syed Humad bin Agha have been viewed
with displeasure by the British Government.

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3. My late communication to His
Highness, and the desert of the Gulf Squadron to
Aden, will, I doubt not, confirm the pacific
views of His Highness. The arrange-
ment made by Ashtan bin Juff, for the res-
toration of those portions of the territory of
Syed Humad bin Agha occupied by the War-
hake Troops, on the payment of a small sum
of money, is very satisfactory, as it removes
every possible call for our interference.
