Translation of a letter from Hajji Jaffer
 agent at Bahrein, to Lieutenant A. D.

S. R. C. Your letter dated 23rd Jomadee
 ul dawla has reached. Its contents have
 been understood. On the 3rd Instant a
 Gossid arrived from Nedjed by name ale
 bin Magrouh, with letters for Oman, Shahr
 from him the nature of their contents
 Fysool had written in a friendly tone to
 Chiefs in those parts saying that he had
 arrived at Ray and seized Ben Seeraj
 and that his affairs were flourishing.

Another Gossid has arrived
 with letters for Esac bin Tarife. Beyond what
 I have mentioned they had no news.

On the 9th a Gossid arrived from
 Fysool by name zeyd bin Sheyraam,
 with letters for Mahomed bin Khulaf
 and ale bin Khulaf acknowledging the

... them that with reference to their desire
... alliance and assistance against De-
... and that they would pay tribute

2. In forwarding this communication I am directed to acquaint you for the information of Her Lordship, that in the opinion of this Government it is very doubtful whether the measures suggested by Lieutenant Colonel Robertson, could be carried out to any good end.

3. The Honorable the Governor in Council is however decidedly of opinion that at the present moment it would be most unwise to attempt so novel a scheme as that proposed by the officiating Resident, since its effect will be to excite the jealousies of all the Powers with whom the plan in question will bring the British Government into collision, and give immediate rise to all that irritation which
