With reference to my despatch to your address, No. 111 in this Department, under date the 6th Instant, relating to the unexpected visit of the Ex-Chief of Bahrein to that Island, I have the honor to report, this receipt of intelligence, that on his way over to, it abends, Sheikh Abdollah bin Ahmed, anchored two days on the Bahrein Shoal in the neighbourhood of Bahrein and there seized three small vessels, all belonging to that place, part of the crews, etc. liberated, and part he took over with him to Bahrein.
